Achievement and Awards For Optimist Year 2019-2020

This year will go down in history for many reasons. Because of the pandemic some clubs were unable to do their normal activities and many did not send in A&A reports, but I am happy to report that many of our Nebraska District clubs continued to adapt and innovate to serve their communities. Four clubs submitted forms for all four quarters: Lincoln Sunrise (10,615 points); Lincoln Evening (9,923 points); Lincoln West (12,800); and North Platte (11,270 points). Congratulations to these clubs. Seven other clubs submitted forms for one or two quarters.

Some of the pre-pandemic (1st quarter) activities around the district included: Halloween parties and events, Thanksgiving projects, food pantry collections and donations, bell ringing for charity, and Christmas projects like mitten and hat and pajama drives. And then the world went crazy!

As clubs could not meet or hold events, some transitioned to Zoom meetings and some corresponded by email. Some clubs transitioned to making donations, collecting and donating masks, and participating in the Essay and Oratorical contests, which had to switch to digital mid-stream. Some clubs were able to have modified outdoor activities.

Many clubs had to cancel or curtail their fundraising events this year, putting a strain on budgets and donations. Perhaps a surprise, five clubs who sent in reports gained new members during this time. This serves as proof that our mission can withstand the worst of times as we continue to bring our message of Optimism to our communities.

We are needed in this world more than ever!

I will be modifying the A&A report form slightly and post the first quarter report on the district website in late December. I look forward to receiving reports from even more clubs this year.

The current year has brought two



significant changes - - - First, a new Executive Director has assumed control of the day-to-

day operations of the Program. Her name is Vicki Denniston Reed and her many years of experience as the Academic Decathlon Coach of her former high school provided great preparation for her new role. She has already recruited two new schools into the Program – Elkhorn North High and Elkhorn South High. The theme for the 2020-21 Curriculum is "The Cold War."

Second, the Program is following the lead of the umbrella organization (United States Academic Decathlon) and all competition events will be virtual. The seven Regionals on January and the State Final on February 19 & 20 will be virtual. For both the Speech Test and the Interview Test on February 19th. volunteers will be needed as judges. Since the Optimist Clubs of Nebraska have been the main sponsor of the Program for its entire 39-year history, Optimist members have been the major source of the volunteers. Nebraska District Optimists Goal for 2020-21 Unrestricted Donations to OIF: \$10.500!

\$10,500 is about what the OI Foundation returns to the Nebraska District annually! Currently, Nebraska has 1,260 members in 44 clubs. Historically OIF has had an 8% member participation! If 8% of our membership participates in the Dime-a-Day Program (\$50 each), \$5,000 would be raised. If Clubs do the minimal \$100 donation (total \$900), \$5,900 does not make it!! How about 20% participation? That would raise over \$13,000. WOW, we are there! But, it would be a lot more FUN to have 50% (\$33,700) or 100% participation!

The growth levels are: Bronze, Green, Burgundy, Blue, Black, Purple, Gold, Orange, Yellow, and the advanced levels are Bronze, Silver, and Gold Pins.

Each performance growth level contains the same areas, but the requirements and activities differ. Areas are: Project Management, Marketing, Continuous Improvement, Organizational Knowledge and Culture, and Communication Skills, and Certification.

To receive the certificates and pins the activities must take place during a twelve-month time frame. There is a brochure that

Optimist Club of ILAM, Katmundo, Nepal

We recently exchanged emails and our club shared what our club is doing and how we are coping with COVID-19. We received the following from their President, Niraj:

"So good to see your email and the way you shared your club activities and involvement. We are very young 12 to 14 clubs and growing here in Nepal. This vear we haven't been able to run any projects or activities apart from few online meetings. The pandemic has held us hostage, if I can put it that way. It's just been some 3 years for me in Optimist Nepal. I've been to optimist conference once, in Ottawa in 2018. I belong to Optimist club of ILAM and my wife, Sunita is in Optimist Club of Parbat. Thankfully none of Optimist members are reported to have contacted COVID but some of our relatives have survived the infection though. My far relative uncle and immediate aunt won the battle last week. It's getting close but my God has kept me safe from it.

By the way, it would be so nice to exchange some greeting cards through pouch, if you will. It might take some 10-15 days by regular postal service. One of the other things I would like to share with you...I and Sunita have a new born baby. She is roughly 1.5 months. We named her Nancy and she has been keeping us busy.

Recently David Catalan shared an email he and Marvin Wastell received from Shyam Kumar Basyal of their sponsored club in Nawalparasi, Nepal.

"Hope this email finds you in good health and high spirits. I am deeply apologetic for taking so long to get back to you. To be honest. October was quite stressful for me personally so I decided to stay away from social media and my emails as much as possible. I even took a 12-day meditation course (in complete silence and solitude - disconnected from the outside world) called Vipassana (which apparently is the practice through which Gautam Buddha attained Buddhahood). I feel very relaxed and energized after the course and also recommend it to both of you, if you are interested.

Indeed, serving the youth is not easy but I and my fellow Optimists are strongly driven towards our mission. Given the ongoing Covid pandemic and how it has impacted school children especially from the poor communities, my home club - OC Nawalparasi Nepal is initiating a new project called 'CI School'where we will be serving the educational needs of children from poor communities that have very few means to attain quality education. A concept note for the same is attached herewith. We are raising funds for the project and if you guys could help in any possible way, I would be extremely grateful. Also, could you please also forward it to your club members and friends.

I promise I'll be better and faster with my communication in the future. Take care of yourself and your family.

Ed. Note: Following is a portion of the concept note that David and Marvin received with the email. "With Nepal's education at a standstill at the moment with slim chances of schools' resumption, CI (Community Inspired) School is something that might aid those students who might have no choice other than giving up on their education for this school year. While the demand for online and zoom classes are on the rise, we should not forget that there a large population of school kids in Nepal who have never seen a computer or know what internet means or how to access it. At Optimist Club of Nawalparasi Nepal, we believe CI School can be a great way to support those kids, not only during the pandemic but even after schools reopen. At CI School, the goal is to form groups of students within a local community and provide them with education to not just support their academic future but also provide them with essential skills for a sustainable living.

What will kids learn at CI School?

Aforementioned, CI will be different from a conventional school in the sense that a lot of emphasis would be given to kids' holistic development. The learning at CI School would range from character development to learning various skills that go beyond the school textbooks. The major learning areas are:

- Moral values and Social skills
- •Nepali and English Conversational skills
- •STEAM based projects
- Basics of Agriculture
- •Environment Preservation and Waste Management...."
