The "Whys" Behind the Proposal!

The Nebraska District Finance Committee is proposing increasing the District Dues \$1 per quarter which would raise the District dues to \$15 per year. There was to be a breakout session at the 3rd Quarter Conference to answer questions. The rational for this proposed dues increase is the District has not increased dues in the past 23 years, but unfortunately the costs associated with the District have not remained as they were 23 years ago.

Many District Optimists have expressed concern about the rising cost of attending the District Conferences and Convention. As everyone is aware, the cost of food, gasoline, and lodging has increased over the past 23 years. Currently the conference centers and caterers are charging 18% gratuity on food and beverages plus 5.5% NE Sales Tax. One gallon of coffee or tea costs the District \$22.00 and with gratuity and tax, the cost is \$27.11. An average conference beverage use is 4 -5 gallons. Meals are also charged the same gratuity and tax. The District is charged for the number of meals that are given to the site prior to the event. If someone or a group who had made reservations but do not attend or stay for the meal, the District will still have to pay for those meals.

The District pays for the Governor, Secretary-Treasurer, Official District Guest and the Hospitality Suite, which is to be covered by the registration fees to the Conferences or Convention.

Not all conference centers provide microphones and projectors for free or have enough equipment for the District. The District has been fortunate in the past that several members loan the

use of their projectors, however no one has microphone equipment to loan to the District. Conference centers charge fees of \$50 to \$75 for equipment. To complicate matters, Optimist International rules for the Oratorical Contest require a lapel mike for the contestants. As a result, the District is looking at a rental fee or purchasing the equipment.

In addition to the previously mentioned items, there are other administrative expenses. Cut-backs have been made through the years, but as we all know, there are always expenses to running a household or an organization.



Yes, we do so many things well in Nebraska: ex. Husker Nation, Runzas, Kool-Aid, and so much more, but two of our Nebraska Clubs have expanded their horizons. They have sponsored two of the seven clubs in Nepal!



Last summer, the Lincoln West Optimist Club sponsored the Optimist Club of ILAM, which is located in Katmundo, Nepal. Early this year, the Omaha Miracle Hills Optimist Club sponsored the Optimist Club of Nawalparasi, Nepal.

Sponsoring an International club provides opportunities to:

Learn about a different culture connecting with like-minded people.

Help spread the mission of OI in areas where there currently is no presence.

Open the doors to new friendships through elec tronic media platforms, including Zoom, Facetime, and WhatsApp.

Become a mentor by providing guidance about project development and requirements.

As a sponsoring club, you will be expected to have a small committee charged with working with the new club overseas via an

electronic relationship. (No, you do not need to travel to Nepal.) Our Miracle Hills Optimist Club Zooms with the club from Nepal at 9:30 pm one Friday a month when it is 8:30 am in Nepal. Sponsor Clubs are asked to help the new club overseas by paying the annual affiliation of \$225 in US dollars and a commitment of 3 years is preferred. The sponsoring club is awarded new club building credit.

If you do not feel like climbing Mt Everest, there are clubs available to sponsor in other countries. The Optimist Clubs of Lincoln West and Omaha Miracle Hills invite you to EXPAND YOUR HORIZONS!!

Columbus Optimists Applied and They Recieved

In 2019, OI announced a Child-hood Health and Wellness Grant designed to increase the physical activity of youth. The Platte County Lifestyle Coalition and the Columbus Optimist Club partnered with Angie Fehringer, and were awarded a \$500 grant.

The Marathon Running Club was started in the fall of 2018 at St. Isidore Elementary School by Angie Fehringer and other parent volunteers. The grant money was used for the Marathon Running Club and was expanded to include St. Bonaventure Elementary School. The program was designed for 5th and 6th graders who met once a week to walk/run for 45 minutes after school.



A half mile course was mapped around the schools. After each lap was completed, the kids were given popsicle sticks to track their distance. At the end of each 45 minute session, the distance in miles was recorded and accumulated over the ten week session. Water bottles were provided to the students and stickers were given to them once the following distances were achieved: 6.2 mi, 13.1 mi (half marathon), 18 mi, and 26.2 miles (marathon).



There were 68 total kids who participated in the running club. Twenty-nine of the 68 kids achieved the Marathon goal! The total miles ran between the two schools was 1,550.5 miles. Perhaps one of the participants said it best when he said, "I like the challenge of the Running Club and really enjoy running with my friends."

A Brief History of Optimist International

Part 4: At the first quarter conference we looked back at the early history of our international organization and learned that the first Optimist Club was formed in Buffalo NY in 1911. Optimist International was formed in 1919 and the first convention was held Louisville. Kentuckv. Creed was adopted in 1922, and from the beginning the clubs directed their major efforts in service to youth. The Oratorical Contest began in 1928 and the organization did well during the war vears when millions of dollars were raised in war bond drives sponsored by the Optimists.

The history review for this quarter begins in the 1950's when clubs were becoming increasingly well-known for their efforts and youth service, and new programs were born:

- Optimist-sponsored boys' homes were created when a young clergyman in San Antonio called attention to the homeless and neglected boys who were sleeping under bridges and on the streets.
- April 1953 Bike Safety Week began
- 1955 the 1000th club was chartered.
- 1957 Youth Appreciation Week began to recognize children and teenagers

During the 1960's a campaign was launched to work against pornography reaching school-age children through the mailbox; and it might be noted that now our programs are addressing internet safety.

 1963 – Optimist Youth Clubs was expanded to include Octagon Clubs for high school students.

- 1964 Stay in School program was created to help reduce the number of high school drop-outs.
- 1965 Respect For Law program was undertaken to combat apathy toward crime and was created with cooperation from the FBI and Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
- 1968 Golden Anniversary Celebration, appropriately in Louisville, KY where the first Convention had been held. Louisville was also the host city for our Centennial celebration last year.

In 1971 there were nearly 3000 clubs and 105,000 members.

- The Optimist International Foundation was put in place
- Tri-Star Sports Program was created
- President Nixon signed the first Youth Appreciation Proclamation

In 1972 the motto was changed to "Friend of Youth" to reflect service to both boys and girls

- The 3000th club was founded
- Society began to realize environmental issues were a concern and the Optimist response was the L-I-F-E program (Living Is For Everything)
- Optimists became the first service club to recognize the need to combat syphilis and gonorrhea by creating a program called AVOID
- In 1978 sponsorship of what is now Optimist Junior Golf Championships began
- Help Them Hear program began to provide support for people with hearing impairments

The April issue will feature "An Optimist Moment from Our History." The Brief History of OI will continue in the May issue by taking us into the 1980s and 1990s as we celebrate our 100 years of service to youth.
