It is time to Update the Bylaws

Last Friday, notice was sent out from OI to Club Presidents and Secretaries stating that clubs need to update their bylaws due to new mandatory language for insurance purposes. If all clubs do not update the bylaws, the cost of insurance will rise and will be passed on to the clubs. As of May 6th, a deadline for the updating had not yet been set, however OI realizes it may take a couple of months for all clubs to complete the updating.

During the Siouxland Summit webinar, OI's Stephanie Monschein said that if clubs had previously sent their bylaws to OI online, the club can go online to update and print off a copy of the byaws for their club. Otherwise the updated bylaws will need to be mailed to OI.

The Board of Directors of the Optimist International Foundation realize that we all are living in a state of uncertainly at this time, but they wish to assure you that they are here to support you and your clubs. Because the 3rd quarter conferences were cancelled, they are concerned that individuals and clubs may have missed opportunities to donate to the foundation. Have You Ever???

Have you ever thought about attending the Optimist International Convention, but decided it cost too much or would take too much of your vacation? Or if you attend the convention each year, have you ever thought that it would be cancelled and you couldn't go?

This year the OI Convention has been re-iMagined! OI President Adrian Elcock announced that all Optimists will have the opportunity to experience the convention from their own home on June 27th and 28th. There won't be any \$125 (plus taxes) hotel room rates and the convention registration is only \$35 for the two days! If you are one of the first 500 to register, the rate is only \$25! Each day there will be keynote speakers, breakout sessions for training, OI catalog vendors, and chat rooms.

If you have never been to the International Convention, this is an opportunity to get a taste of the OI Convention experience. If you are a regular attendee, this is an opportunity to keep up-to-date and in touch with your OI Convention friends. Online registration is planned to open on May 11th.

Presidents, It Is Time to Vote

Presidents, May is the time for you to cast your Club's vote for 2020-21 Optimist International leadership. If you are uncertain who to vote for, go to the Ol website www.optimist.org, open the Member Resources tab and look for 2020 International Election on the left hand side of the first page. Discuss it with you fellow club members, select your candidates, and VOTE!.

It's New! The Learning Management System

The Learning Management system is a centralized training tool for President-elects and other club officers. The LMS went online May 4th. Presidents who signed their club up will receive a password to access this site from TOVUTL. Please check your junk mail or spam if you have not received it. If you are unable to locate this email, contact Michelle Turner at Optimist International at michelle.turner@optimist.org.

Once you have your password, share it with your officers for the 2020-21 year so they can begin their online training. Should one of your officers be serving again in the upcoming year, they will also need to complete the training modules. The officers can complete the modules at their own pace. LMS has a comment section to provide information or to point out any errors in any module.

Everyone using the Learning Management System is encouraged to take time to watch the welcome video in order to become acquainted with this system. Besides officer training, there are modules on using Zoom within your club, success planning, and concussions from sports injuries. The Learning Management System will be continually updated with new modules for club use.



A Re-iMagined CCDHH

The Nebraska District Communication Contest for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing (CCDHH) was



held on Sunday, April 26th, via Zoom. Originally planned as an inperson event at the Clifton Center in Lincoln, we

were forced to use Zoom due to closures and the effects of COVID-19. It was fortunate for us that our partner in this, the Regional Programs for Students who are Deaf & Hard of Hearing, has had experience using Zoom for such things; making the transition relatively easy. Only those necessary for the event (three judges, an interpreter, the host, the three participants, a Regional Program Director and myself (as emcee and timer) participated in the event.

The judges watched each of the participants and emailed their scores to our Regional Director, who assisted me in tabulating the scores and determining the scholarship winners. The interpreter helped those participants and judges communicate with the rest of us throughout the event which lasted just over an hour.

The Nebraska District receives one \$2,500 scholarship from the Optimist International Foundation which we have named in memory of long-time CCDHH supporter. Chet Arnett. The family of Katie Gurnsey,a sign language interpreter who was severely injured in a car accident a few years ago,

Hamilton Relay and Optimist Clubs in the Nebraska District collectively provide funds for a second matching scholarship. Since there were only three participants this year and all were seniors, funds were sought for an additional scholarship of \$1,000 to be provided along with the two we typically provide. The Omaha Breakfast Optimist Club generously offered to fully support the third scholarship so everyone truly was a "winner" during this year's event.

- 6) Conduct a membership recruitment drive (NOW Program.)
- 7) Club President and Club President-Elect (or two designees) attend District convention or two other district conferences.

8) Be current on District and OI dues and fees.

*The President's Pride Report is due at the end of the year, September 30th. You can get online and start the report anytime you want. Then go back in anytime you want to update your numbers and information. Just save as you go. It is there until you finally submit it.

Norfolk Noon Optimist Club sponsored "Show & Tell" projects for Middle School students. Students who participated in the "show" part of "Show and Tell" drew or painted a picture that showed what they thought it meant to be an Optimist or what they had to be optimistic about. The participating students in the "tell" part of the project submitted a videotape of themselves giving a 2 - 3 minute speech telling what they thought it meant to be an Optimist during this pandemic and school closure. #CovidKindness Challenge

A challenge from the New York-New England Optimist District has challenged members to: "Providing kindness can make the world better one person at a time during a pandemic."
